





Red cloth with gilt-stamped spine and cover titles; black ruled border on front cover. Black emblem on front cover with motto "Progress Before Precedent." Red endpapers. Title page in red and black. Contents include: Louis H. Sullivan, Thinker and Architect by A. W. Barker -- Harvard Architecture: Its Recent Achievements and Tendencies Discussed by R. Clipston Sturgis -- Suburban Development and Colony Life: Being an Article on the Organization and Subdivision of Property, and the Thorough Planning of Small Individual Homesteads -- A Fouraine Garden by Wetherill P. Trout -- Recreation Piers on River Front in Philadelphia by Wm. Copeland Furber. Front fixed endpaper bears blue-and-black bookplate of Edward A. Teitelman (d. 2010), doctor and architectural historian, signed Sellers. In Very Good Condition: edges slightly rubbed; closed tear of 3-cm. or less from lower edge of 3 leaves; clean and tight. 2. Architectural Association Sketch Book: 1909 and 1910; Edited by Gerald C. Horsley, Theodore Fyfe, & W. Curtis Green. London and New York: Architectural Association; Charles Scribner's Sons, 1910. 149 plates, as issued in original wrappers for each of the 8 quarterly parts published in 1909 and 1910, the whole in a portfolio with a green cloth spine and green boards printed in black, with cloth ties. The first quarterly part of each year also contains a leaf bearing an illustrated title page for the year and a leaf bearing an Index, which lists all the plates for the year. The 4 parts for 1909 contain 73 architectural plates (including 2 double-leaf plates, each counted as 2 plates); the 4 parts for 1910 contain 72 plates (3 double-leaf plates, each counted as 2 plates). Remains of paper label at tail of portfolio spine. The plates have been hand-numbered in pencil. The wrappers and title leaves have only the London publication information. The plates were produced by the "Ink Photo" process of Sprague & Co., a London business that pioneered this transfer lithography method to create tone in an image that was similar to the rich detail produced



by the collotype method, but cheaper and easier to use. In Very Good Condition: cloth is separating along back joint of portfolio and at head of spine; chipping along edges of wrappers, which have generally separated along folds; fore-edge of 1909 title leaf is heavily chipped, not impacting text or illustration; minor chipping along a few plate edges; other than soiling along edges of some plates, not impacting image, the plates are clean and bright; all 8 parts are complete. 

Light green wrapper printed in black, with publisher's catalog Technische Werke & Zeichnungs-Vorlager, on back wrapper. Wrapper title. Running title: Leichte Holzbauten. A 19th-century owner had it bound with black cloth spine and corners and black paper over boards. Former owner's inscription on front fixed endpaper: "Eigenthum des Tischlermeister Brandt." No date of publication; listed in Bayerische Landeszeitung for 1869. Issued in two parts, with 6 leaves of plates in each; all 12 are included here. Adolph Guggenberger entered the workshop of German sculptor Anselm Sickinger (1807-1873) around 1860 as an architectural draftsman workig on the altars designed by Sickinger. Little else is known about him. The drawings are of small wood structures -- sheds, huts, and gazebos, as well as the larger Tanz-Salon. Not in WorldCat; very scarce. In Fair+ Condition: cover is rubbed with loss at corners; wrapper is lightly soiled; closed tear of 2 cm. from lower edge of front wrapper; old dampstain along lower gutter of all plates; heavily foxed; minor loss at lower corners of plates; otherwise, clean and solid. 

In 2004 Iraqi-British architect and designer Zaha Hadid (1950-2016) was the first woman to receive the Pritzker Architecture Prize. A heavy set; for international shipping, the U.S. Postal Service requires that it be shipped by priority/expedited shipping. Books are in Near Fine Condition: minor scrape on lower spine of Major and Recent Works; covers are slightly rubbed; internally clean and tight. Italian architect Giuseppe Vaccaro (1896-1970) distinguished himself by his daring architectural experiments combining Italian construction tradition with the avant garde technology of the beginning of the 20th century. Active from the early 1920s through the end of the 1960s, he designed the the Palazzo delle Poste e Telegrafi in Naples (1928-36), the Scuola di Ingegneria in Bologna (1931-35), and the AGIP holiday residences at Cesenatico (1936-38), among others. 

French, Jr. When the College of New Jersey became a university in 1896 the name was changed to Princeton University. To unify the campus, Collegiate Gothic was chosen for the design of new buildings. The Philadelphia architectural firm Cope and Stewardson designed Blair Hall and Little Hall, which were completed in 1897. This book contains the drawings




of the new library by William A. Potter, which was completed in 1897, now known as the East Pyne Building; the dormitories on Nassau St. by Raleigh C. Gildersleeve, known as Upper and Lower Pyne; and detailed proposed designs by Cope and Stewardson for the new Graduate College, lecture hall, physical laboratory, and a lower dormitory. The Cope and Stewardson designs for the additional buildings were not chosen by Princeton University. Very scarce. 

The only copy we have seen or see reference to that has 102 numbered plates, rather than 100. See Hitchcock 1435-1437, all calling for 100 plates. Samuel J. Dornsife (1916-1999) pioneered authentic restoration and recreation of 19th-century interiors for both houses and museums. In Good Condition: back board detached but present; front board partially detached; lacking leather from tail of spine; boards are rubbed; plates 88-102 reattached by old repair; otherwise, clean and solid; all plates are present.
