

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
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

The Death-Bed Confessions of the Late Countess of Guernsey, to Lady Anne Hamilton: Developing a Series of Mysterious Transactions Connected with the Most Illustrious Personages in the Kingdom; To which are added, The Queen's Last Letter to the King, Written a few days before her majesty's death, and other Authentic Documents, never before published. London: s.n., 1822. 132 p.; 16 cm. Lacking binding. Purports to be the confession of the Countess of Guernsey (1753-1821), who takes the blame for the scandalously poor relationship between Queen Caroline and King George IV. Variously attributed to: Lady Anne Hamilton (1766-1846); Olivia Serres aka Princess Alive of Cumberland (1772-1834); Hamilton and Serres together; and Shakespeare forger William Henry Ireland (1777-1835). Whoever the author was, it inspired Edgar Allen Poe's "The Purloined Letter." Scarce. In Fair Condition: lacking lower part of title page, with loss of imprint except for th "L" from London, and lacking upper corner, without loss of text; closed 7-cm. tear in title page; pages are brown and slightly stained; complete. 

Extrait du Tome XIII des Mémoires de l'Académie Royale de Médecine. "Ch Ravel" written next to title and a note in the same hand on the title page; several additional ink notations in the text. Disbound from a collection of pamphlets owned by French homeopath Dr. Charles Ravel (1822-1887). The author, Frederic Dubois d'Amiens (1797-1873), was a French physician and historian. He became the Royal Academy of Medicine's Secrétaire Perpétuel in 1847, on the death of Étienne Pariset, and served until his own death in 1873. Étienne Pariset (1770-1847) was a French physician who founded the Société Protectrice des Animaux and was a doctor at the Salpêtrière Hospital, where he was the physician for the insane. 

Signatures: [A]2 B-F4 (8vo). Woodcut head piece and tailpiece. Disbound from a miscellanous volume. Early American Imprints, 1st series (Evans), 37695. President George Washington had died on December 14, 1799, less than three years after leaving office. His sudden death inspired mourning throughout the new nation. Major William Jackson fought in the American Revolution and became aide to Major General Benjamin Lincoln before being assigned to General Washington's staff. In 1796 Washington appointed him Collector of the Port of Philadelphia, which post he held until 1801 when President Thomas Jefferson dismissed him. In 1799 Jackson became president of the Society of the Cincinnati, remaining in that office until his death in 1828. Very scarce. 

Magee, artist, lithographer, and engraver, was located at 48 or 49 S. 3rd St., Philadelphia, only in 1860. Engraved by A. Biggerman after an engraving by John Sartain. Print of deathbed scene of the Reverend John Wesley. Others shown in the image (as identified by Sartain): Sarah Wesley, a medical assistant, the Rev. J. Bradford, the Rev. P. Dickinson, Mrs. Charles Wesley, the Rev. T. Rankin, Mrs. E.A. Rogers, Miss Ritchie, the Rev. J. Rogers, the Rev. J. Creighton, Master Rogers, R.C. Brackenbury, the Rev. T. Broadbent, the Rev. A. 

The subject of this volume is Jean Victor Marie Moreau (1763-1813), a French General under Napoleon Bonaparte, who was banished from France in 1803. He arrived in New York City in 1805 and settled near the Delaware River in northern New Jersey. In 1813 he returned to Europe and was mortally wounded at the Battle of Dresden in August 1813. Very scarce. Attached is the official printed order to Samuel Pelcer, the collector of Monroe, for tax collection based on the assessment roll, with directions for the distribution of the collected money to the town superintendent of schools, the commissioners of highways, the town supervisor, and the county treasurer; signed by 15 men on 22 Nov. 1845. Contains the assessment of real and personal property of approximately 350 residents of the town of Monroe, Orange Co., N.Y. Lacking original front board and most leather over spine; otherwise, in Very Good Condition: text block split; manuscript text is complete; pages lightly soiled; printed order is intact and clean. The committee consisted of Alexander King, William F. Packer, William A. Crabb, Maxwell McCaslin, and George Darsie. Disbound from a volume of unrelated 19th-century pamphlets. "14" in ink at upper right-hand corner of title page. Cohen, Bib. of Early American Law, 10634. Jesse Miller (1800-1850) served as sheriff of Perry County, Pa., before being elected first to the Pennsylvania House of Representatives, then the state Senate, and then the U.S. Congress. Scarce. Price was a prominent British advocate of American independence and these works played an important role in the American Revolution. 







18. Read, John Meredith. Opinion of John M. Read, Esquire, Against the Right of the City Councils to Subscribe for Stock in the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, and to Increase the City Debt and Taxes for that purpose. Philadelphia: Printed for the

Committee, 1846. 30 p.; 22 cm. Disbound from a volume of unrelated 19th-century pamphlets. "13" in ink at upper right-hand corner of title page. Printed by the United States Book and Job Printing Office, Philadelphia. John Meredith Read (1797-1874) was a Philadelphia lawyer who served in the Pennsylvania legislature and as Philadelphia's city solicitor. He became U.S. district attorney of the eastern district of Pennsylvania in 1837 and sat on the state supreme court from 1858 to 1874. In 1846 the Pennsylvania Railroad was incorporated and began to seek subscribers to its stock. At a public meeting, a resolution was adopted recommending that Philadelphia and other municipalities in the state become subscribers, which would require that taxes be levied to cover the costs. The opinion of John M. Read was requested by Andrew Miller, Evans Rogers, and Clement C. Biddle, of the Philadelphia Saving Fund Society, regarding whether the city could be authorized to purchase stock in the railroad. Here Read explains why he was of the opinion that the city did not have the authority to buy railroad stock nor to raise a tax for cover such a loan. He also argued that "such powers were impolitic, inexpedient and dangerous to be vest in a municipal body." The appendix contains data on the state of the city and county finances at that time. Circular stamp of Dickinson College Library on title page (sold at an auction of items withdrawn from the library). The author, Sébastien Le Prestre Vauban (1633-1707), is considered one of the greatest military engineers of all time. In this treatise he used statistical data to support his argument that all taxes should be repealed and replaced by a standard 10% tax on all agricultural output and on all income from trade and manufactures. After the work was condemned by the royal government, he attempted to reclaim all the copies that he had given away. He was fairly successful -- WorldCat shows only one copy dated 1707. In Fair Condition: lacking 2 leaves of plates?; lacking front board; back board is detached; lacking much of leather and gilt from spine; lacking leaf preceding title page; title page is lightly soiled; minor loss at a few lower page corners; light soiling of a few corners.
