





- 1. Army War Show at Franklin Field, Philadelphia, June 1942, to support Army Emergency Relief [flyer]. Philadelphia: Army Emergency Relief, 1942. 1 sheet: 23 x 15 cm. Printed on both sides in red, blue, and black. Flyer for the advance sale of souvenir tickets to the Army War Show held at Franklin Field, in Philadelphia, June 20, 22-27, 1942. The show benefited Army Emergency Relief, which had been established earlier that year. The Army War Show had started in Baltimore before making its second stop, in Philadelphia. One side is illustrated with a tank, the other with several military images as well as a small poster-style illustration of a soldier in the background and a woman with a child in the foreground captioned "Take the load off his heart!" Extremely scarce World War Two piece of ephemera. In Good+ Condition: 2 closed tears of 1 cm. each from one edge; light creasing, particularly one upper corner; light soiling. (#002304) \$28.00
- 2. Centennial Program: Military Day Wednesday, June 20th, 1900. Beaver, Pa.: Beaver College, 1900. 1 sheet 24 x 16 cm. Illustration of a log cabin, signed E. Bott. Although the centennial referred to in the title is that of the founding of Beaver County in 1800, the emphasis on Military Day was on Beaver County's role in the American Civil War. The reception was headed by Lieut. Gen. Nelson A. Miles (1839-1925); from 1895 to 1903 he was the last Commanding General of the United States Army, prior to the office being abolished. The 140th Pennsylvania, 17th Cavalry and Washington Infantry hosted visiting regiments. A monument was presented and music was provided by Duss' Band, the Chorus Club, the Grand Orchestra, and the Misses Morgan, Wilcox, and Potter. In the evening one could enjoy alumnae tableaus at Beaver College for 35 cents. 

Forrest of Washington, Pa., and the Library of the Museum of Northern Arizona, which received the book from Forrest. Verso of title page contains a stamp for the Washington County Historical Society, Washington, Pa. Earle R. Forrest (1883-1969) was an author, newspaper reporter, cowboy, and photographer from




Washington County, Pa. Although he spent most of his working life there, he made a number of trips to the West, specifically to Arizona and Montana, which he documented in photographs and books. This work





4. Flanders, Henry. Address of Mr. Henry Flanders Before the Graduating Cadets at the Military Academy West Point July 11, 1888. West Point, N.Y.: West Point Military Academy, 1888. 8 p.; 17 cm. White wrappers. Wrapper title. "July" crossed out and "June" written next to it. Henry Flanders (1826-1911) was a member of the Board of Visitors for the United States Military Academy at West Point. According to the New York Times: "Mr. Flanders spoke in a clear, strong voice, and was easily heard throughout the assembly." Flanders was born in New Hampshire and practiced law in Kentucky and South Carolina before settling in **Philadelphia**. He also wrote Treatise on Maritime Law (1852), Treatise on the Law of Shipping (1853), Lives of the United States Chief Justices (1855), Memoirs of the Cumberland (1856), An Exposition of the Constitution of the United States (1860), Treatise on the Principles of Insurance




(1871), Adventures of a Virginian (1881), and The Life of John Marshall (1904). In Very Good Condition: wrappers are lightly dust soiled; 3 vertical creases; lacking original stitching; internally clean. (#003501) \$45.00



Lescure, printer to the state, 1850. 1 leaf 23 x 16 cm. Printed on one side only, within decorative border. Disbound from a volume of unrelated 19th-century pamphlets. The rules specified the payment of pensions and gratuitites to veterans of the Revolutionary and Indian wars or their widows. Very scarce. In Good- Condition: lacking lower left-hand corner, without impact on text; one vertical and one horizontal fold; partially separated along each fold in lower part of leaf with minor impact on text; small chip at lower edge, with no impact on printing; light foxing in upper part of leaf. RULES ADOPTED BY THE JOINT COMMITTEE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES ON PENSIONS AND GRATUTTIES, SESSION OF 1850. Let, Two months' service in the Revolutionary or Indian wars prior to the treaty with the Indians at Grazville, in 1795, shall entitle the soldier, or his widow, to a gratuity of forty dollars. 2nd. Four months' service as aforesaid, shall entitle the applicants to an annuity of forty dollars, payable half yearly, to commence on the first of January, 1850. 3rd. Widows of soldiers of the Revolutionary or Indians were, who were married previous to the date of the services rendered as aforesaid by their hasbands, shall be coulded to a gratuity or pension, as the case may be, according to the services performed by their husbands, 4th. Proof of the petitioner being in accessious circumstances will be required in all cases; or a certificate from a member of the Legislature, stating that he knows, personally, the petitioner to be poor and in need of assistance, 5th. Proof by one or more credible witnesses, that the services were performed in the Pennsylvania line or militis, will be required. But in case the applicant makes outh or affirmation that positive evidence cannot be obtained in relation to services outh or aliamation that posture retained cannot be obtained in reason to services readered, then the following will be received; A fetabel statement of the time and kind of service performed by the applicant, and the officer under whom he served, verified by his own outh or affirmation, and accompanied by the deposition of two er more respectable persons, stating that they are acquainted with the perimeter—that he is worthy of credit—that they believe his statement to be true—and that he is generally is wortey or reconstruction seeds to a same the second of the respectability of the witnesses to be certified by those who have known him to have been in the Revolutionary or Indian war. The respectability of the witnesses to be certified by two justices of the peace of the neighborhood where they reside, or by one or more members of the Lagislatum; and the like residence shall be received in support of the applications of widows of soldiers of the Revolutionary or Indian war. 6th. The applicant must set forth, in his or her petition or accompanying documents, the services performed, the length of time served, and the fact of his or her being in necessitous circumstances; to which statement he or she most be aween or 7th. No person who has received a gratnity at a former session will be allowed 8th. A certified copy from the War Department, of the documents on which a pen-sion was procured from the United States, for a soldier of the Revolution, will be considered evidence of the right of the watow to a grainity or procion, agreeably to the rules adversarid; Provided Assessor, That the widow a all a til cases, poore her identity, by the oath or affirmation of some person or persons having a knowledge thereof, or by general reputation. 

Additional stamp on front fixed endpapers indicates that these volumes were given to the Society in 1932 by Mrs. A. Conrad Jones, from the library of Major William H. Bean. Call number written in white at tail of each spine. Major William Heebner Bean (1861-1904) graduated from West Point in 1886 and joined the Second Cavalry; during the Spanish American War he served in Cuba. In 1900



he was appointed Captain in the Subsistence Department and promoted to Major in 1902. He and his father, Col. Theodore W. Bean (d. 1891), were instrumental in the establishment of the Historical Society of Montgomery County. At the time of his death, he was preparing a work on the movements of General Washington in Montgomery County during the American Revolution, particularly focusing on the time at Valley Forge. The donor of the volumes was Major Bean's sister, Mary Louise Bean Jones (1863-1957). A heavy set; for international shipping, they will have to be sent by priority international. 

Three stab-holes, but no other evidence that this was ever bound. Edges are untrimmed. Title page reads "Anno Regni Georgii II. Regis . . . Decimo Septimo. At the Parliament begun and holden at Westminster, the First Day of December, Anno Dom. 1741, in the Fifteenth Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Second . . . And from thence continued by several Prorogations to the First Day of December, 1743, being the Third Session of this present Parliament." The woodcut coat of arms of George II above the imprint. Woodcut historiated initial at the beginning of the act. Passed to bolster the British naval efforts against France. In Near Fine Condition: lower corners lightly creased; clean and bright. 

Armorial bookplate on front fixed endpaper of Carlos B. Lumsden with motto "Dei Dono Sum Quod Sum." Written next to the bookplate: "Stolen from P.D. Hughes." On the back endpapers are written the titles of several biographies and histories with the page number on which they are mentioned in the text. Major Carlos Barron Lumsden (1878-1916), 18th Battalion Highland Light




Infantry, was the son of Hugh Gordon Lumsden of Auchindoir and Clova, Aberdeenshire, and Maria Magdalena, daughter of Carlos Pedro Gordon of Wardhouse and Kildrummy. He served as a trooper in Roberts' Horse in the South African War; he also was a barrister-at-law and the author of The Dawn of Modern England (published



1910). He married Geraldine Fitzgerald, with whom he had two children. He enlisted in Aug. 1914 and died at the front in France on March 8, 1916, of "syncope," presumably exhaustion or a heart attack. The subject, Sir Harry Burnett Lumsden (1821-1896), was a British military officer in India who was appointed to establish and lead the Corps of Guides, a regiment of the British Indian Army. He and one of the authors, his brother Peter Stark Lumsden, were probably distant relations of the former owner, Carlos Barron Lumsden. Lacking the map of the Afghan frontier; otherwise in Very Good Condition: corners rubbed; cover lightly soiled; head of spine starting to fray; light damp stain along upper edge of plates, not impacting illustrations; plates are otherwise clean and tight; text is clean and tight. 



The life of Admiral Edward Pellew, 1st Viscount Exmouth (1757-1833), a British naval officer who fought during the American Revolution (when he was taken prisoner at Saratoga), the French Revolutionary wars, and the Napoleonic wars. 





121-126. Without publisher's advertisements found on 2 additional leaves in some copies. Former owner's armorial bookplate ("Nec Degenero") on front fixed endpaper for William Lane Joynt. Possibly the William Lane Joynt (1824-1895) who was the founder of the Limerick Athenaeum and was elected Mayor of Limerick in 1862 and Lord Mayor of Dublin in 1867. Faint name in an old hand at the head of first page of the introduction. In Good+ Condition: most of leather is lacking from both upper corners and along spine on both boards; some gilt is lacking from spine; slight loss of leather at head of spine; front joint starting to separate from each end; other than the few pencilled notations noted above, pages are clean and tight.
