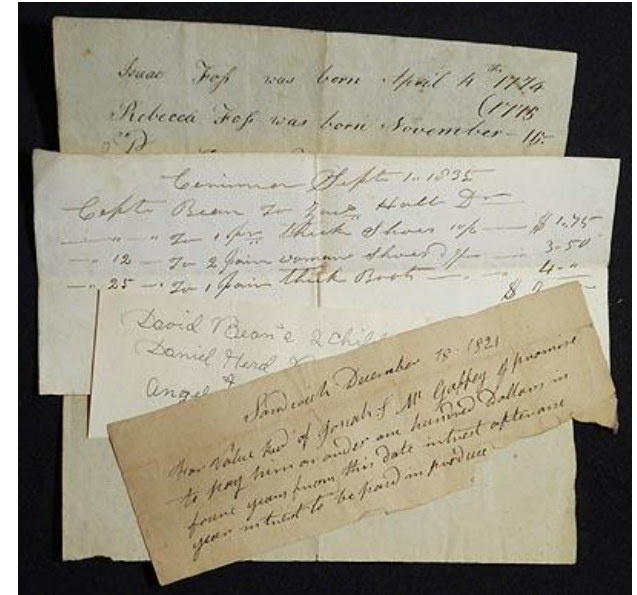

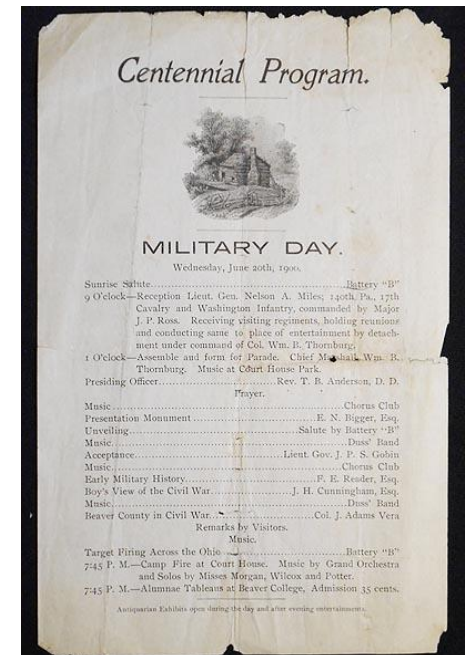



Bean Family Manuscript Documents. 5 handwritten documents relating to the Bean family of Sandwich (New Hampshire?). **(1)** Sandwich North Class paper, Sept. 1806 -- list of members of a church class led by James Bean; the list is headed by James Bean and Peggy Bean, who are marked with a "B" for "Believer." **(2)** "Grandmother Beans family" by Lizzie Tibbitts Pratt -- birthdates of Peggy Harvey Foss (Nov. 6, 1779) and her brothers and sisters, signed "Peggy Bean." **(3)** a promise to pay Josiah McGaffey \$100, dated Sandwich, Dec. 18, 1821, with the promissor's name removed. **(4)** bill for shoes and boots purchased by Cept. Bean in 1835. **(5)** names of David Bean's children, in a modern hand. In Good Condition: lacking half of the lower part of the 1806 document; folds and light soiling. (#005825) \$25.00



2. Centennial Program: Military Day Wednesday, June 20th, 1900. Beaver, Pa.: Beaver College, 1900. 1 sheet 24 x 16 cm. Illustration of a log cabin, signed E. Bott. Although the centennial referred to in the title is that of the founding of Beaver County in 1800, the emphasis on Military Day was on Beaver County's role in the American Civil War. The reception was headed by Lieut. Gen. Nelson A. Miles (1839-1925) who served in the Civil War, the Indian Wars, and the Spanish American War; from 1895 to 1903 he was the last Commanding General of the United States Army, prior to the office being abolished. The 140th Pennsylvania, 17th Cavalry and Washington Infantry hosted visiting regiments. A monument was presented and music was provided by Duss' Band, the Chorus Club, the Grand Orchestra, and the Misses Morgan, Wilcox, and Potter. In the evening one could enjoy alumnae tableaux at Beaver College for 35 cents. 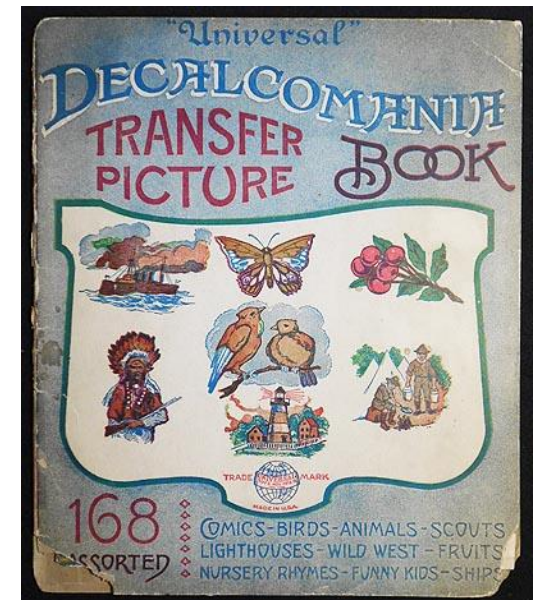


3. Charles, Viscount Townshend. **Letter to Christopher Tilson, esq., written at the Hague on Feb. 13, 1711.** 1 sheet 23 x 18 cm. Charles Townshend, 2nd Viscount Townshend (1674-1738), was an English Whig politician who served as Secretary of State for the Northern Department from 1714 to 1717 and again in 1730 and 1731. He was known as Turnip Townshend because of his strong interest in raising turnips. From 1709 to 1711 he was ambassador extraordinary and plenipotentiary to the States General where he took part in the negotiations which concluded the Treaty of Utrecht, ending the War of the Spanish Succession. He writes to Tilson regarding financial matters and "the trouble you have had with the care of my affairs." Presumably written by a secretary and signed by Townshend. 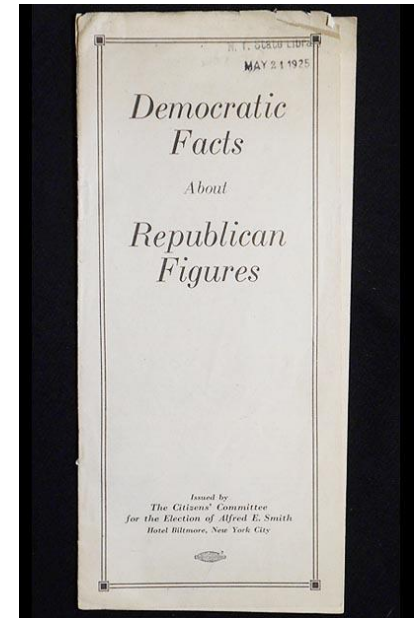

The back contains directions and identifies this collection as no. 610. The front states that it originally contained 168 assorted images. Partially used, with approximately 110 present. In addition, 15 decals were transferred by a former owner to the inside of the front cover, with 7 of those being early Disney cartoon Oswald the Lucky Rabbit (5 of those are still crisp]. No date of publication. Oswald the Lucky Rabbit was created by Walt Disney and Ub Iwerks in 1927 and taken from them by Universal Studios in 1928. Images of athletes include one referring to Charles Lindbergh's nonstop flight from New York to Paris in 1927 and another referring to Babe Ruth. Images also include boy scouts, characters from children's stories, images typical of American westerns, caricatures of different nationalities, and others. 5. Democratic Facts About Republican Figures. New York: Citizens' Committee for the Election of Alfred E. Smith, 1922. 12 p.; 23 cm. Wrapper title. Stamped on wrapper: "N.Y. State Library May 21 1925." Pamphlet published during the 1922 campaign for governor of New York state. Alfred E. Smith (1873-1944) had served as governor in 1919 and 1920, when he was defeated for re-election by Nathan L. Miller. He won re-election in 1922 and served from 1923 to 1928. This pamphlet responds to arguments by Governor Miller's campaign that his administration had saved money. Scarce. 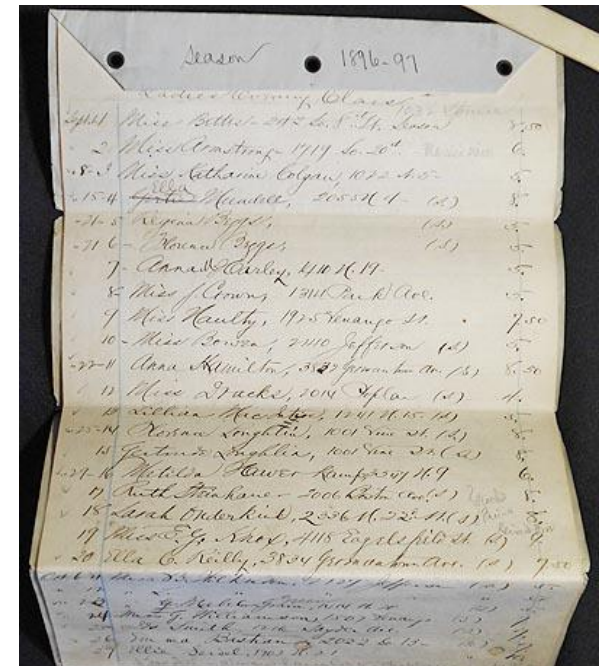
6. Glycerine and Associated Industries. "Save your Waste Fats to make explosives!" [war effort flyer]. Washington, D.C.: War Production Board, 1942. [approx. 50] yellow flyers (19 x 10 cm.) stapled together to display and allow individual flyers to be torn off. With: a post card to order additional materials from the Fat Salvage Unit, Bureau of Industrial Conservation, War Production Board, Washington, D.C. No date of publication but the Glycerine and Associated Industries began a campaign in 1942 to educate the American housewife to save fats and greases, which were necessary to produce gunpowder and other ammunition. The next year the Fat Salvage Committee stated that 150 million pounds of household fats had been salvaged in the previous 12 months by American housewives and the Army and Navy. He was famous for his political cartoons, in particular those featuring Colonel Blimp. Contents: Max, Lord Beaverbrook -- Viscount Cecil -- Clemence Dane -- Mr. Amery "On behalf of the British Empire" -- Marconi -- Sir Austen -- St. Loe Strachey -- L. G. [in pencil on back: Lloyd George] -- J. H. 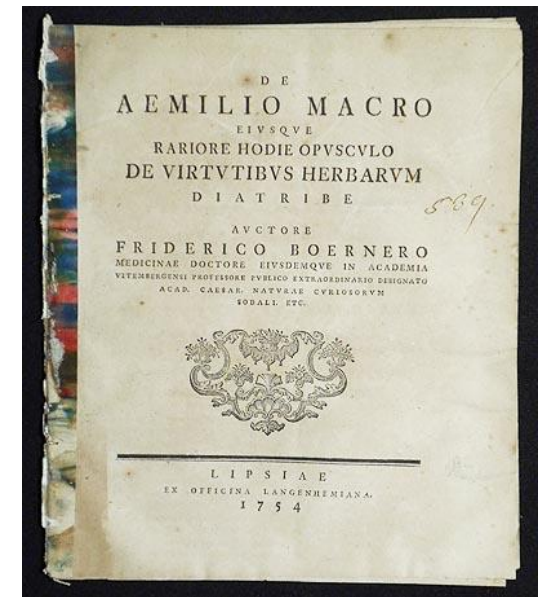

Four lined sheets, hand-numbered, attached to a light grey wrapper and headed "season 1896-97." The unidentified proprietor of the dancing school listed the students by class: Ladies Evening Class (56 students); Gentleman's Evening Class (56 students); Ladies Afternoon (44 students); Private Waltzing Lessons (17 students); and Children's Class (23 students). The 196 students are listed presumably by the date they joined the class, with street addresses for each. 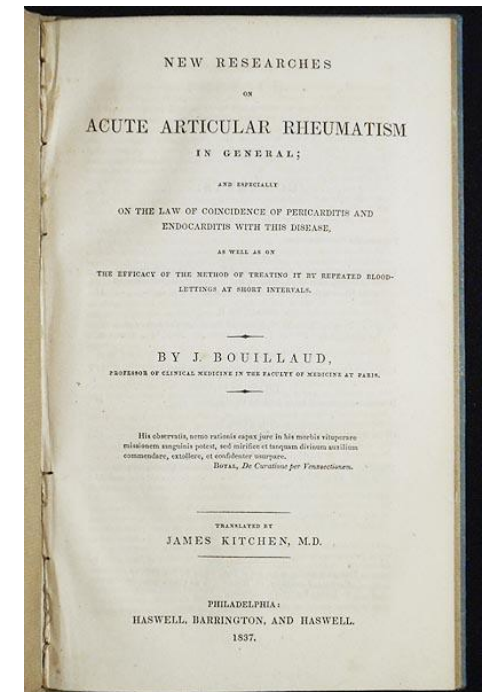

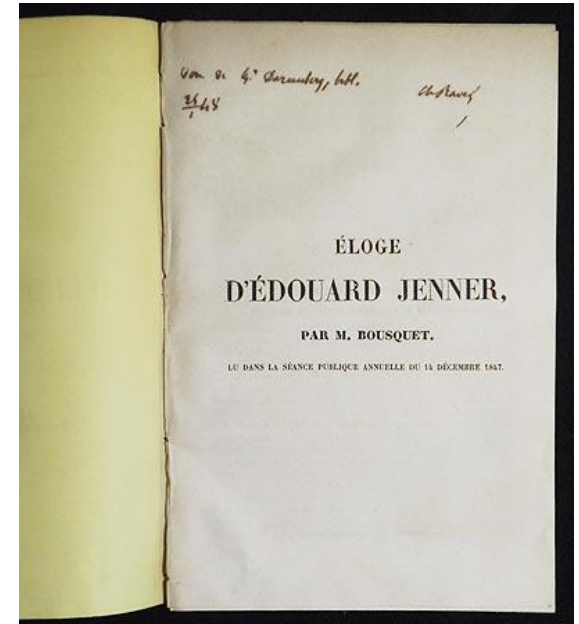

[6], 20 p.; 21 cm. Disbound from a collection of pamphlets owned by French homeopath Dr. Charles Ravel (1822-1887). Remains of original marbled wrapper along spine. Engraved title vignette, head-piece, initial letter, and tailpiece. "539" written on title page in an old hand. The author, Friedrich Börner (1723-1761), was a German physician who published a number of works on earlier doctors and naturalists. Here he discusses De Viribus (aut Virtutibus) Herbarum, often attributed to Aemilius Macer of Verona, a Roman poet. It has since been attributed to Odo Magdunensis, a medieval French physician. 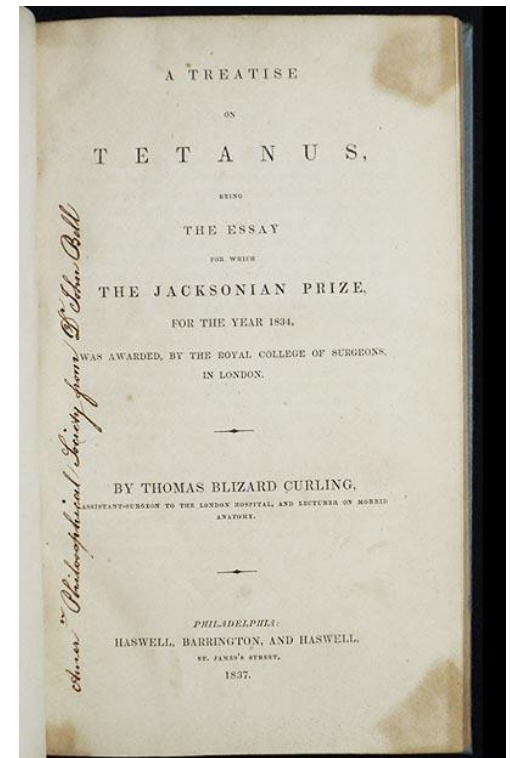

The author, Jean Baptiste Bouillaud (1796-1881), was a French physician; among his contributions was showing a correlation between rheumatism and heart disease. 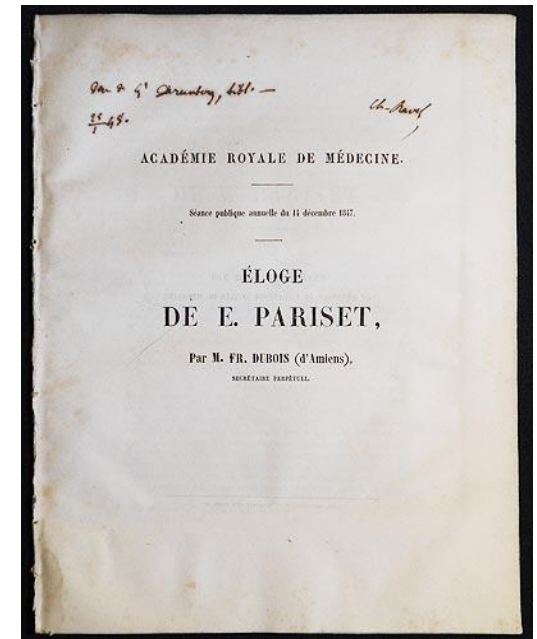

Jean Baptiste Edouard Bousquet (1794-1872), who headed a commission on vaccinations in France, writes glowingly of the life of Edward Jenner (1749-1823), English doctor and developer of the smallpox vaccine. 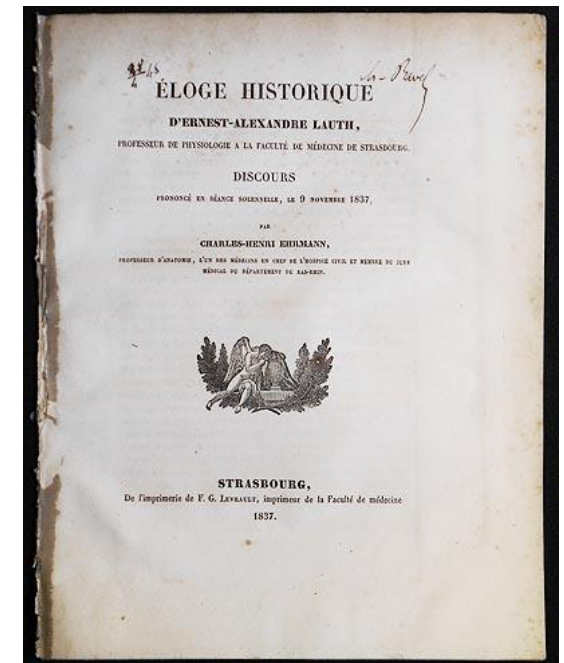

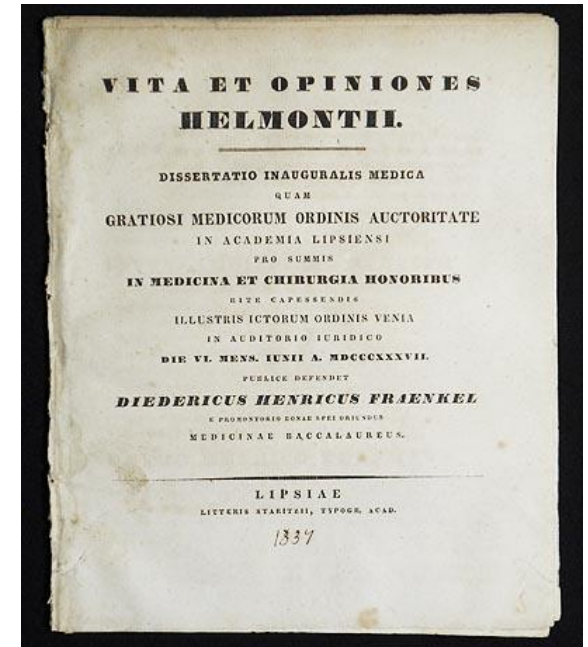

He became the Royal Academy of Medicine's Secrétaire Perpétuel in 1847, on the death of Étienne Pariset, and served until his own death in 1873. Étienne Pariset (1770-1847) was a French physician who founded the Société Protectrice des Animaux and was a doctor at the Salpêtrière Hospital, where he was the physician for the insane. 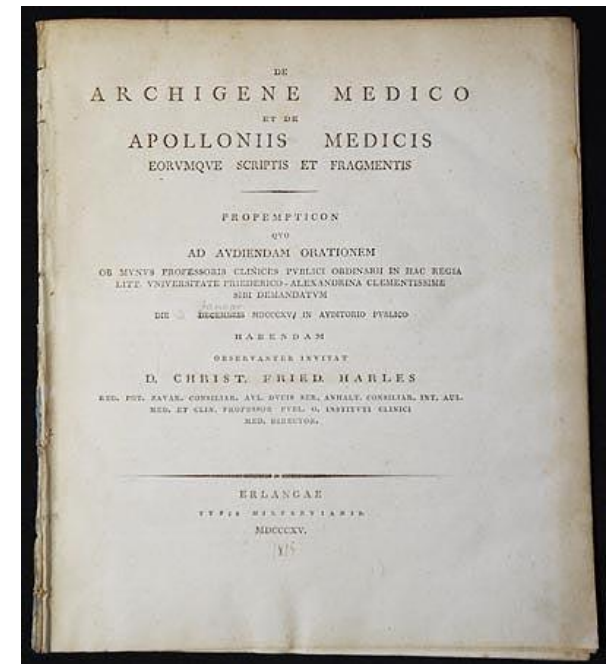

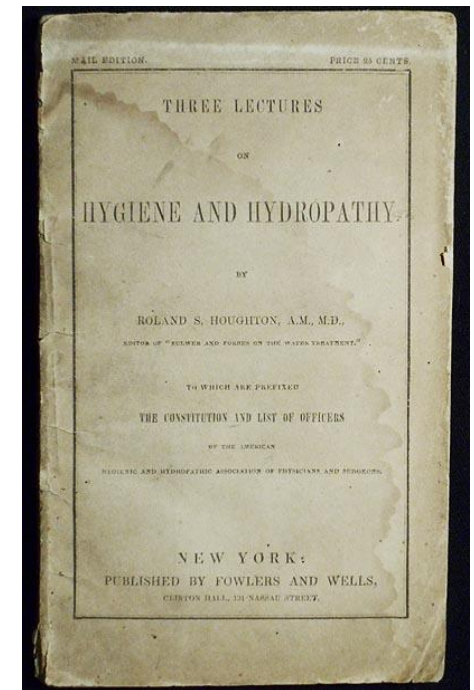

He returned to Worcester, S.A., where he practiced medicine. His father, Dr. Siegfried Fraenkel, had been the first Jewish settler of the area. Scarce. 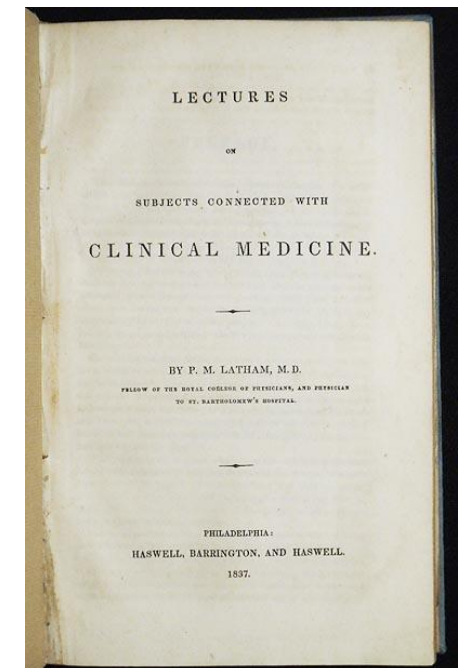

Disbound from a collection of pamphlets owned by French homeopath Dr. Charles Ravel (1822-1887). The author, Johann Christian Friedrich Harless (1773-1853), was a German physician who served as a director of a clinical institute in Erlangen beginning in 1805 and in 1818 went to Bonn as a professor of pathology. Based on the natural philosophy of Schelling, he developed a theory of electropathology. 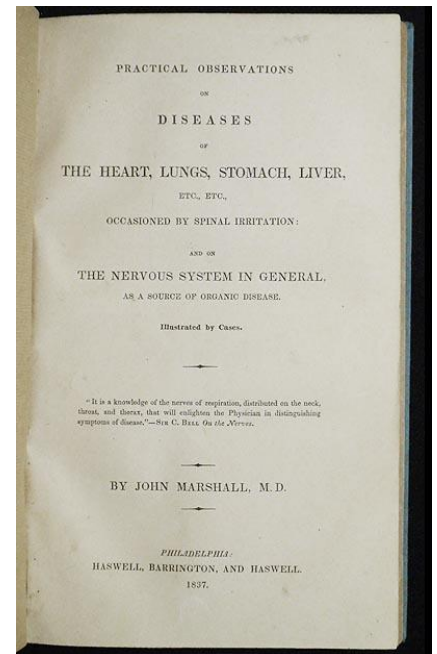

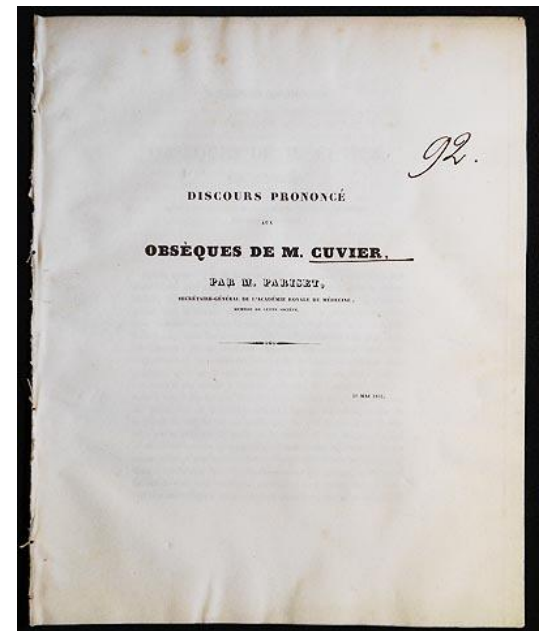

The author, Peter Mere Latham (1789-1875), was an English physician and medical educator. He delivered these lecture at St. Bartholomew's Hospital. 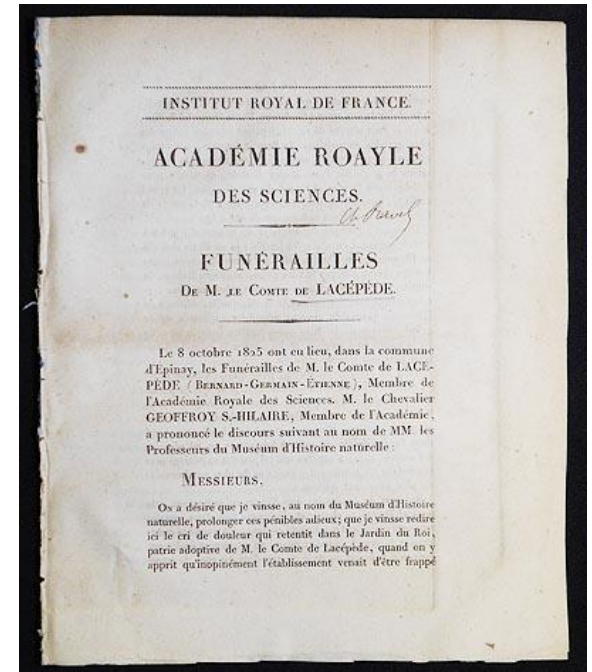

John Bell (1796-1872) received his M.D. from the University of Pennsylvania in 1817. He practiced medicine in Philadelphia, lectured at the Philadelphia Medical Institute, and was a member of the American Philosophical Society. This work has been incorrectly attributed to John Marshall (1818-1891), the English surgeon and teacher of anatomy. The dedication is dated 1835 and in the Preface the author states: "for nearly eighteen years I have devoted myself to the study of diseases of the spine and spinal nerves." In other words, he had been studying the spine since before John Marshall (1818-1891) was born. The work is dedicated to Robert Burt, M.D., Edinburgh, although the author was in Manchester when he wrote the dedication; he also refers to 20 years' practice of medicine in Scotland. In the first case study Marshall refers to being at the British Military Hospitals in France in 1815 and 1816. In Near Fine Condition: light stain on front board; clean and tight. Very scarce. 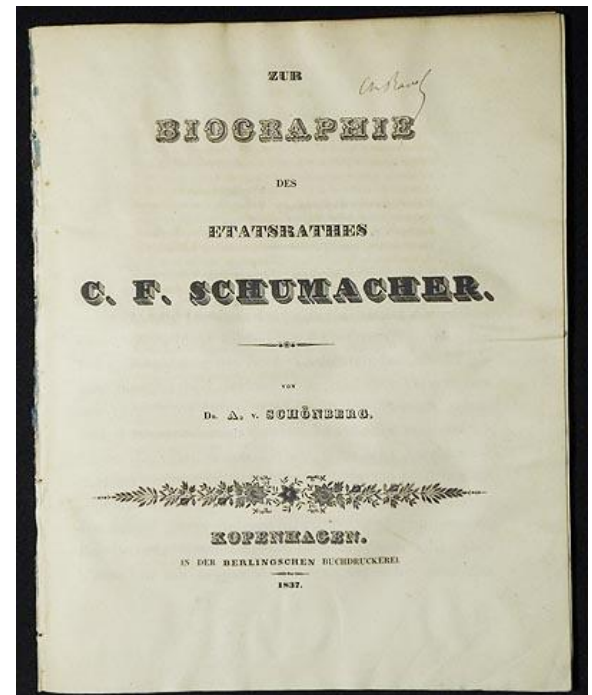

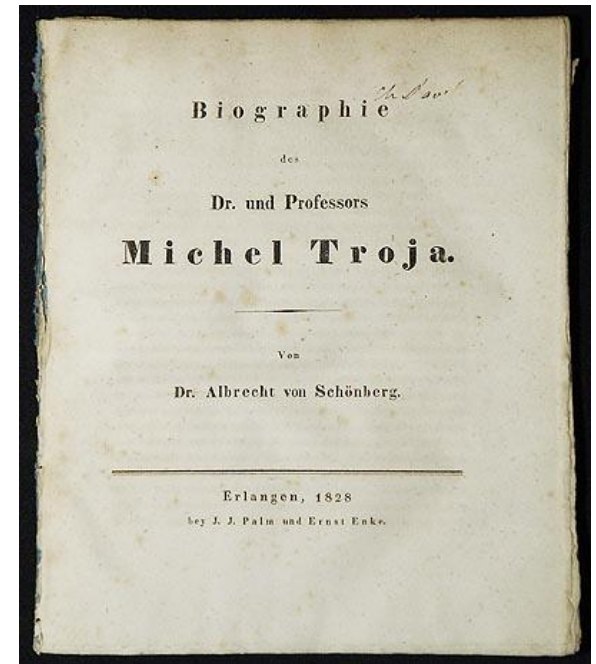

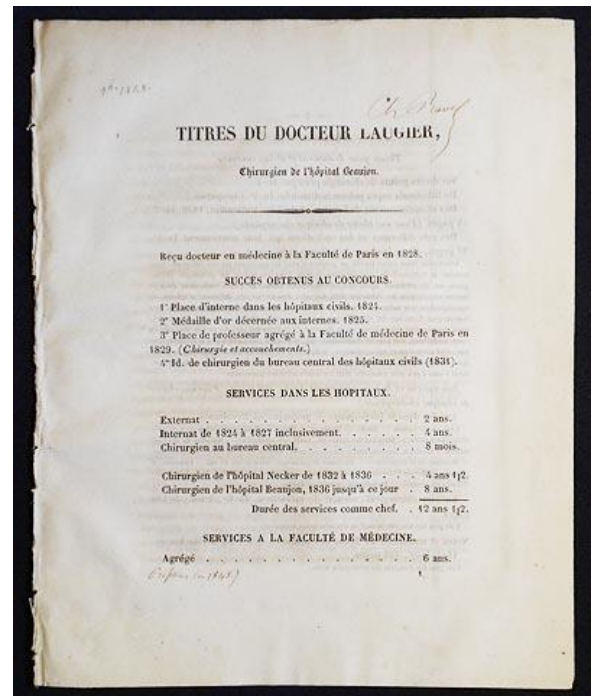

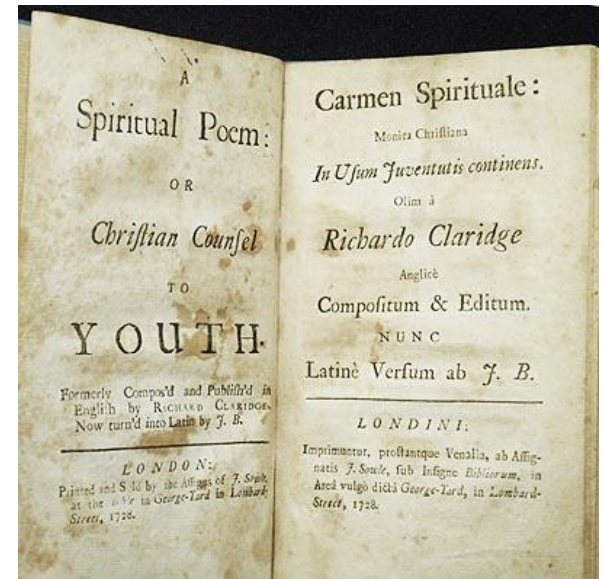

Poems are in English and Latin on facing pages. Former owner's name on blank side of added title page: "John Pemberton's 1789." John Pemberton (1727-1795) was an American Quaker who travelled through Europe as a minister. Richard Claridge (1649-1723) was an English Quaker who had previously been an Anglican minister. 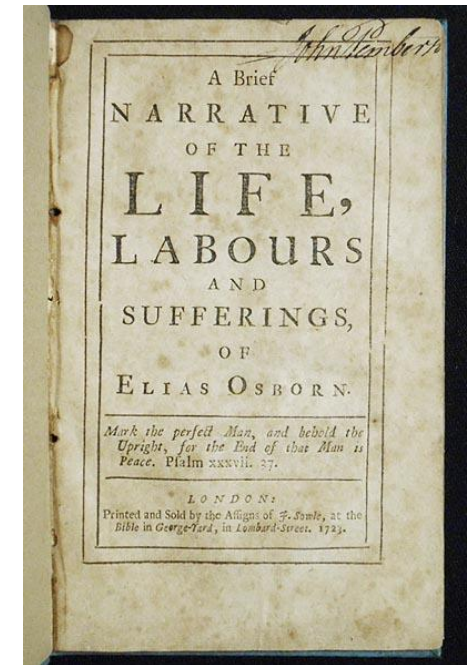

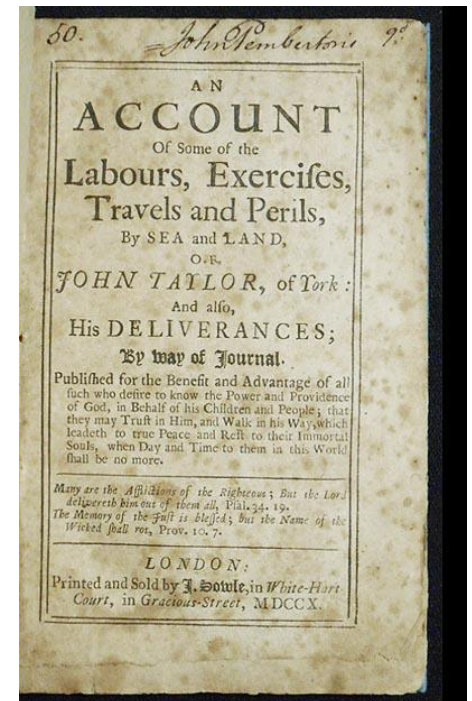
