



1. Buchanan, James. Mr. Buchanan's Administration on the Eve of the Rebellion. New York: D. Appleton and Co., 1866. x, [1], 10-296, 3-8 p.; 24 cm. Publisher's dark green pebble-grain cloth with gilt-stamped spine title "Buchanan's Administration." Blind-ruled border on each board. Pale yellow endpapers. Publisher's advertisements on 6 pages following text. In pencil on front free endpaper: Patterson. Bookplate on back fixed endpaper indicates that the book was given to the Washington County Historical Society in 1911 by D.F. Patterson. Although this book was published without the author's name on the title page, the Preface is dated Wheatland, Buchanan's home in Pennsylvania. James Buchanan (1791-1868), the 15th President of the United States, failed to address the secession of seven Southern states, which led to the beginning of the Civil War shortly after the end of his term in office. He was widely blamed for the war, sometimes called "Buchanan's War." In this work, he sought to defend his actions (and inactions). At the head of the Preface, Rhice Nicholas also wrote that he purchased the book in 1839. Short handwritten index on back free endpaper. Felcone, New Jersey Books, 641. Rhice Nicholas was a justice in Morris County, N.J., in the 1830s. The section on slaves discusses the prohibition of the slave trade in New Jerse as well as other laws relating to slaves, with the form to be used for manumission. Judson was an active member of the bar in Washington County, Pa., in the 19th century. J. Carter Judson was admitted to the bar in the county in 1877; in 1892 he and his father formed a partnership. He served in the Pennsylvania state senate from 1911 to 1914. Very scarce. 

Lester Hayden Humphrey (1850-1902), of Warsaw, N.Y., was Vice President of the Wyoming County National Bank from 1873 to 1888 and became president of the bank in 1890. He was also involved in the salt industry in New York state and in Hutchinson, Ks. He was a member of the New York state senate from 1896 until his death in 1902. Frank Wayland Higgins (1856-1907) served in the New York Senate from 1894 until 1902, when he was elected lieutenant governor of the state. In 1903 he was elected the 35th governor of New York. Although he is described as




"Governor" in the inscription, this was taken in 1901, when both men were serving in the N.Y. State Senate. Humphrey died before Higgins became governor. Major William Heebner Bean (1861-1904) graduated from West Point in 1886 and joined the Second Cavalry; during the Spanish American War he served in Cuba. In 1900 he was appointed Captain in the Subsistence Department and




promoted to Major in 1902. He and his father, Col. Theodore W. Bean (d. 1891), were instrumental in the establishment of the Historical Society of Montgomery County. At the time of his death, he was preparing a work on the movements of General Washington in Montgomery County during the American Revolution, particularly focusing on the time at Valley Forge. The donor of the volumes was Major Bean's sister, Mary Louise Bean Jones (1863-1957). A heavy set; for international shipping, they will have to be sent by priority international. 



Combines recipes and testimonials about the uses of Hamlin's Wizard Oil. The recipes include Welsh Rarebit made with ale or lager; Lemon Crackers; Uncooked Chile Sauce; Game Pie; Beef Steak Roll; Creamed Peach Pie; Chow Chow; and Florence's Pie. Very scarce. 



The Army Emergency Relief was established in Feb. 1942 to assist soldiers and their dependents. In July 1942 "This Is the Army" by Irving Berlin opened on Broadway to raise funds for the AER. The production consisted of an actual Army unit, which included a cast and crew of over 300 soldiers. A national road show was then organized, and in the summer of 1943 the movie was filmed. This program was for the performances at the Civic Opera House in Chicago in the first half of January, 1943. It lists every performer, including Burl Ives (1909-1995); Claude Watson on the banjo and Cesare Pascarella on the cello; Gary Merrill (1915-1990); Julie Oshins (1906-1956); Marion "Spoons" Brown (1915-1947); and, of course, Irving Berlin (1888-1989). Includes cartoons and advertisements; information about the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (WAAC) is on the inside of the front wrapper. Very scarce. 

He was one of the founders of the American Guild of Organists and became a trustee of the New England Conservatory of Music.
