


1. Avacado Lodge, Sea Girt, N.J. [calling cards?]. Philadelphia: John Wanamaker, 1920. 2 cards, 10 x 6.5 cm. Two different designs. "John Wanamaker, Philada." embossed in small letters along lower edge. Avocado Lodge was a summer house built in Sea Girt, N.J., by Philadelphia Quaker Elliston P. Morris. After his death in 1914, his daughter Elizabeth Canby Morris inherited Avocado, which was sold in 1947 after her death. These two cards, on which the name of the house has been misspelled Avacado, were possibly produced by John Wanamaker as samples, illustrating two different designs. Undated, but possibly around 1920. In Good/Very Good Condition: one card is slightly soiled; the other card is more heavily soiled, with a small green stain impacting part of the printing; no writing or tears on either card. 

William Morris Davis (1850-1934) was an American meteorologist, geographer, and geomorphologist. He taught geology at Harvard University from 1876 to 1912. In Good Condition: front wrapper is darkened along spine and lower edge; wrapper is otherwise lightly soiled; edges are chipped; a few pages opened carelessly; interior is clean and tight. 

The works presented during the week were La Sorciere (Victorien Sardou); La Dame aux Camelias (Alexandre Dumas, fils); Adrienne Lecouvreur (Sarah Bernhardt); and Angelo, Tyrant of Padua (Victor Hugo). These appearances were part of Sarah Bernhardt's Farewell American Tour, 1905-1906. Includes advertisements for many Philadelphia-area busineses, including Stephen F. Whitman & Co for Whitman's chocolates and confections. Also: a full-page illustrated ad by United Fruit Co. for vacations by steamer to Jamaica. 

Contains individually paginated reports issued from 1901 to 1906 as parts of the Annual Series and Miscellaneous Series of British Diplomatic and Consular Reports on the United States. Contents: reports on the trade and finance of the United States; on the purchase and holding of lands by aliens; on various aspects of trade in the United States: beet sugar, cattle and meat, cement, coal and coke, horse, iron ore, rice, and zinc; on the railways of the United States; on the trade, commerce, navigation, and agriculture of specific American cities and parts of the country; and on the Chicago summer vacation schools. 





8. Herbert, Joseph. **Honeydew with music by Efrem Zimbalist** [Chestnut St. Opera House playbill]. Philadelphia: Chestnut St. Opera House, 1921. 1 sheet (20 x 7.6 cm.) printed on both sides. Book and lyrics by Joseph Herbert; music by Efrem Zimbalist; staged by Hassard Short; orchestra under the direction of Max Hirschfeld. Having read Honeydew by Joseph Herbert while on vacation with Fritz Kreisler, Efrem Zimbalist suggested that they each write a comic operetta. Kreisler produced Apple Blossoms, which became a hit on Broadway, and Zimbalist eventually completed Honeydew, the Scourge of the Sea, which opened on Broadway in 1920. This contains the only music for the musical theater by Zimbalist. The songs include: Drop Me a Line Some Time, Believe Me Beloved, A Cup of Tea, and It's a Small, Small World. One separately published piece from "The Cousins: A Collection of Duetts for Two Performers on the Piano Forte Selected from the Best Authors." All 19 pieces are listed on the title page. Printed by Weller & Greene. Published jointly with: New York: J.E. Gould & Co.; New Orleans: H.D. Hewitt; Cleveland: S. Brainard; Louisville: G.W. Brainard & Co.; and Boston: C.C. Clapp & Co. Upper right-hand corner bears an embossed stamp of S.P. Hinds, "Teacher of & Dealer in Music and Instruments," Newark. There is no date of publication given, but based on the street address used by Oliver Ditson (115 Washington St.) and the other publishers listed it was probably 1852. This contains a fourhand setting of Henri Herz's music, without the lyrics to the song. 



"In all pieces of three or four parts the two lowest staves can be used as a pianoforte or melodeon accompaniment." Contains songs by the arranger under his own name and under his pseudonym, Alice Hawthorne, including "The **Summer** of the Year." Also contains songs by Stephen Foster and many others, including "Over the **Summer** Sea." An extremely scarce collection of compositions and arrangements of popular music by Philadelphia musician Septimus Winner (1827-1902). In Good+ Condition: cloth starting to separate from each end of spine; loss at wrapper corners, with minor loss of printing from lower corner of back wrapper; wrapper slightly soiled; occasional light foxing; faint writing inside of back wrapper; otherwise clean and tight. This edition does not contain the ruled pages referred to on the title page. Bitting, p. 42, notes that pages 372-384 are blank--here they contain part of the index. Includes "Food and Drink for the Sick" as well as "Artistic Cooking." Useful recipes that may come back in fashion include those for pigeon pie and slippery elm bark tea. Final section contains recipes for the fireless cooker, popular in the early 20th century. Front free endpaper bears former owners' names: Mrs. Cecil Davis and Bettina J. Davis of Greenfield, Ind., dated 1933. In Fair



Condition: cover heavily soiled; ends of spine frayed; edges rubbed; front joint weak and separated for 6 cm. from head of spine; old dampstaining along edges of first few leaves, most prominent on frontispiece; front free endpaper, half title, and frontispiece are detached but present, with chipping to fore-edges; 1-3-cm. section lacking from fore-edge of frontispiece and



This is an early edition of this cookbook, with a front wrapper illustration of a maid presenting a dessert. The back wrapper shows two cans of Karo, with red and blue labels, and a box of Kingsford's corn starch floating above a stack of pancakes. Emma Churchman Hewitt (1850-1921) was an American author of fiction as well as cookbooks and other works of nonfiction. Product endorsement inside front wrapper by the author Marion Harland (1830-1922). Contains recipes for bread and rolls; griddle cakes and waffles; cakes and cookies; fillings for layer cakes; pies; puddings (including Tipsy Parson) and custards; sweet sauces; gravies and meat sauces; ice creams and ices; beverages; entrees (includng Spruce Beer, and Temperance Punch); souffles and omelets; vegetables; soups; "For the Invalid"; and candy making (including Comanche). No date of publication; section about the Lancaster General Hospital is dated 1912. Contains advertisements for Lancaster County businesses. Recipes include: apple snow; meat cakes; apple omelet; walnut pie; transparent pies; temperance mince pie; Comanche candy; kippered cherries; and various ice cream and water ice recipes. In addition to recipes, includes other household tips such as how to take care of your parasol during the winter and how to bleach a straw bonnet. Handwritten recipe on front fixed endpaper for sponge cake from "Mrs. S." The Memoranda pages include two handwritten recipes: "Gertie Rogers fine Ginger Cake" and "Miss Landis Devil Food." Scarce. Black repair of spine. Anthony J. Drexel established the Drexel Institute of Art, Science and Industry in 1891 as a non-degree-granting institution (in 1914 the school began granting bachelor of science degrees). This cookbook would have been used by the Department of Domestic Science and Arts. The author, Helen M. Spring, was the first instructor of cookery at the Institute. Contents: Beverages -- Mushes and Gruels -- Broths and Soups -- Vegetables -- Eggs -- Meat and Fish -- Cheese -- Salads -- Fruits -- ICC

Cream -- Dishes Prepared with Gelatine -- Pastry -- Bread anc Cake -- Mixtures with Baking Powder -- Cakes -- Candy.
