






The unpaginated, 8-page Appendix is present but has not been sewn in. A few pages are unopened. This is number 659 of a limited edition of 750 copies. Numerous translations of the manuscript known as the Greek Anthology have been made. The introduction to this privately printed edition of the section called the Amatory Epigrams is signed "M.S. Buck, Philadelphia, 1916." The work of Mitchell Starrett Buck (1887-1959) was usually published by Philadelphia bookseller Nicholas L. Brown. Buck produced this English translation from the French translation "Anthologie Greque, Traduite sur le texte publie d'apres le manuscrit palatin par Fr. Jacobs." In Very Good-Condition: leather is rubbed; lacking 1/2 cm. at head of spine; pages are clean and tight. An attractive edition of this English translation of short Greek verses on love. No year of publication; 1930 is the year assigned in library records. Alfred Louis Charles de Musset-Pathay (1810-1857) was a French poet, dramatist, and novelist. This autobiographical novel, first published in 1836, is based on his **love** affair from 1833 to 1835 with George Sand (French novelist Amantine-Lucile-Aurore Dupin (1804-1876)). The New Yorkers opened its pre-Broadway tryout in Philadelphia on Nov. 10, 1930, before it moved to Newark on Nov. 24 and then opened on Broadway on Dec. 8, 1930, where it ran for 168 performances. The Prohibition-era musical satirizes New Yorkers, from high society types to con men, bootleggers, and prostitutes. Fred Waring and his Pennsylvanians made their first appearance on Broadway in this show. Although Cole Porter is credited with music and lyrics, of the 17 songs in the Broadway show all five of the songs performed by Durante were written by Durante himself. Those by Porter include his perennially popular Love For Sale. The program lists the 22 musical numbers included in Philadelphia, some of which were dropped before the show opened on Broadway. Written in pencil next to photograph on mount: "Printed by the house of T. Herlyison." The fountain was designed by Jean-Pierre Defrance and built next to the famous Gros Horloge in 1743; the bas relief depicts the mythological scene of the river Alpheus and the nymph Arethusa, and Cupid flying above them. This photograph includes a man waiting for a bucket to fill at the fountain and a woman carrying a bucket and moving off to the right. The window to the right of the fountain says "Debit de la Fontaine." The second photograph (209 x 270 mm), on the other side of the card mount, is an albumen print identified along the lower mount edge as only "Rouen." It shows the Fontaine Sainte-Marie, built in 1879, with the original lights on either side. Wendell Phillips Stafford (1861-1953) was a member of the Vermont House of Representatives in 1892 and a judge on the Supreme Court of Vermont from 1900 to 1904, when he was appointed to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia by President Theodore Roosevelt. He served in the latter post until retirement in 1931. He was also a published poet, the author of several books of poetry published in the beginning of the 20th century. Nearly 50 years later, near the end of his life, this collection of Stafford's poems about a lost **love** was printed by Arthur Rushmore at his Golden Hind Press, also near the end of Rushmore's life. 




