Publisher's advertisements on 6 pages following text. In pencil on front free endpaper: Patterson. Bookplate on back fixed endpaper indicates that the book was given to the Washington County Historical Society in 1911 by D.F. Patterson. Although this book was published without the author's name on the title page, the Preface is dated Wheatland, Buchanan's home in Pennsylvania. James Buchanan (1791-1868), the 15th President of the United States, was considered a "doughface" during his presidency, meaning that he was a Northerner with Southern sympathies. Today he is considered to be one of the worst presidents because of his failure to address the secession of seven Southern states. This failure led to the beginning of the Civil War shortly after the end of his term in office. At the time he was widely blamed for the war, which was sometimes called "Buchanan's War." In this work, he sought to defend his actions (and inactions). 

First Edition. In 1896, before the presidential election, Edgewood Publishing Company published Life and Distinguished Services of Hon. Wm. McKinley and the





Great Issues of 1896 (21 chapters and 501 pages, with a frontispiece and 30 photographs), which is widely available. However, in 1897, following William McKinley's election to the presidency, Edgewood Publishing hurried into print this updated publication, with a new cover and title: The Great Battle for Sound Money Led by Wm. McKinley (23 chapters and 518 pages, with a frontispiece and 36 photographs). The two additional chapters found here are: Chapter 22: McKinley's Inaugural Address: A Lofty Appeal to All Patriotic Americans for the Prompt Solution of the Great and Pressing Problems of the National Government and Chapter 23: McKinley's Cabinet: Wise and Distinguished Men Who will Aid in the Affairs of State. The 6 additional photographs are of members of the new administration: Joseph M'Kenna, Attorney General; Lyman J. Gage, Secretary of the Treasury; Russell A. Alger, Secretary of War; James A. Gary, Postmaster General; John D. Long, Secretary of the Navy; and James Wilson, Secretary of Agriculture. Extremely scarce. 





The citizenry and its emotional responses are used as the measure of a successful president, rather than the ostensibly rational appraisals of scholars" [from the back cover]. 

The author, William Linn (1790-1867), was an Ithaca attorney and the son of the Reverend William Linn (1752-1808) of Albany. The latter had expressed his opposition to the election Thomas Jefferson to the presidency in the pamphlet Serious Considerations on the Election of a President (Trenton, 1800). That his fear that Jefferson's election would "destroy religion, introduce immorality, and loosen all the bonds of society" [Sowerby, no. 3226] was unfounded is shown in his son's biography of Jefferson. In Very Good Condition: minor loss at lower corner of frontispiece, with closed 1.5-cm. tear from lower edge; foxing throughout; one marginal note in blue; otherwise, clean and tight. 

The author, John Pitman (1785-1864), was a federal judge for Rhode Island from 1825 to his death. The Professor Goddard to whom he gave this publication may have been William G. Goddard, professor of philosophy and belles-lettres at Brown University from 1825 to 1842. In Very Good Condition: title page and last pages slightly soiled; lower margin of pages 18 and 19 slightly soiled; last leaf detached from stitching but held by three 20th-century staples. 



Champagny to General Armstrong, dated Paris, January 15, 1808."--p. [3]. Early American Imprints, Second series (Shaw & Shoemaker), 16408. John Armstrong (1758-1843) served as U.S. Minister to France from 1804 to 1810. Champagny's letter relates to the ongoing Napoleonic Wars between France and Great Britain, and the difficult position of the United States as Great Britain continued to impress Americans into the British navy and restrict the United States' ability to trade with France. 



Printed by order of the house of representatives." Early American Imprints, Second series "Shaw & Shoemaker," 16453. Contains communications from 1806 and 1807 between James Madison, U.S. Secretary of State, and Ministers Extraordinary and Plentipotentiary of the United States in England, James Monroe and William Pinkney, while they negotiated the Monroe-Pinkney Treaty of 1806. President Thomas Jefferson rejected the treaty because of its failure to stop England from impressing Americans onto their ships during the Napoleonic Wars. This was one of the issues leading to the War of 1812. 

"Part IV. Accompanying the message of the president of the United States, received the 22d March, 1808. March 23, 1080. Printed by order of the house of representatives." Early American Imprints, Second series (Shaw & Shoemaker), 16411. James Monroe served as U.S. Ambassador to England from 1803 to 1808, and James Madison served as U.S. Secretary of State from 1801 to 1809. In this letter, Monroe is responding to Madison's previous communications relative to the impressment of Americans by the British navy in general and the Monroe-Pinkney Treaty in particular. Senator Elihu Root argues persuasively against exempting American vessels passing through the Panama Canal from paying the tolls charged on other vessels. After much debate, the canal act was amended and, from the official opening of the Panama Canal in 1914, American vessels using the canal were treated the same as those of other nations. Elihu Root was a leader in the fight to keep the United States from granting itself a special advantage in relation to the canal. **27. Democratic Facts About Republican Figures.** New York: Citizens' Committee for the Election of Alfred E. Smith, 1922. 12 p.; 23 cm. Wrapper title. Stamped on wrapper: "N.Y. State Library May 21 1925." Pamphlet published during the 1922 campaign for governor of New York state. Alfred E. Smith (1873-1944) had served as governor in 1919 and 1920, when he was defeated for re-election by Nathan L. Miller. He won re-election in 1922 and served from 1923 to 1928. This pamphlet responds to arguments by Governor Miller's campaign that his administration had saved money. Scarce. In Good Condition: front wrapper lightly soiled; upper corners creased and torn; wrapper separated for 5 cm. from head of spine. (#005867) \$35.00

**28.** Jared Hoch of Oley for County Commissioner: 1884. Oley, Pa.: Jared Hoch, 1884. 1 card (55x 88 mm.) printed on one side with decorative border. In 1870 Jared Hoch (1825-1909) was one of the commissioners of the Friedensburg Turnpike Road Company in Berks County. Here he offers himself as a candidate for county commissioner of Berks County, Pa., at the Democratic Nominating Convention, having been next to highest in the two former conventions. It is unknown whether he was the Democratic candidate, but he was not one of the three men who began serving three-year terms in 1885. Ephemera from 19<sup>th</sup>-century local political campaigns is scarce. In Near Fine Condition: one corner rubbed; clean and bright. (#006879) \$35.00

Robert Emmet Monaghan (1822-1895) was a Pennsylvania lawyer and represented Chester County in the state legislature. His mechanical vote counter was patented on March 14, 1848. This pamphlet reports on the demonstration of the machine given to the Pennsylvania House of Representatives in 1849. Ink notations on p. 3 correct the description of the levers indicating Yea and Nay votes. In Very Good- Condition: first leaf and last leaf are detached but present; light foxing on p. 8; otherwise, clean. (#005100) \$125.00

This roll when inserted in the Register is readily adjusted by a gauge in such a manner, that when the *affirmative* index is put in operation it perfortase the list under the word Yau, and directly against its corresponding name; while the negative index operates in the time manner, and perforates the list under the word Yau, on the opposite side of the same name. Each name, on the roll as thus placed in the Register, is supplied with an affirmative and negative index, corresponding to the words. Yeu and May, as printed on the opposite sides of the name.
